






















SHOWING UPPER RAIL REMOVED FOR SITTING CASES

U. S. OFFICE OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE DESIGN FOR FOUR-STRETCHER ABBULANCE BODY TO BE USED ON CONVERTED 1939, 1940, AND 1941 FOUR-DOOR FORD, CHEV-ROLET, AND PLYMOUTH SEDANS

Pictures show conversion of 1939 Ford. Weight as shown approximately 275 pounds more than original sedan body. Rear spring strengthened by insertion of two additional leaves obtained from auto wrecking yard. Chassis frame lengthened by welding on pieces of channel iron obtained from scrap. Body mounted on frame by blocks of sufficient height so wheels have ½-inch clearance when body depressed to make contact between frame bumpers and rear axle. Body fastened to frame by pieces of bent iron bolted to body floor and welded to chassis frame. Panels are ½-inch hardwood plywood. Stretchers are standard Army size.
