I was later commissioned Second Lieutenant and went back to the 44th Infantry. Honorably discharged on February 5, 1919.

Am now 47 and in first-class health. Married, no children. Have a new car. Am engaged in operating my mining property down here, but as gold mining is not rated as vital to national defense, that can wait until this present mess has been cleaned up.

If it would be of any help, I may mention that I am thoroughly familiar with every city, town and hamlet in the State. Know and am familiar with every road and highway in the State, and am thoroughly familiar with every foot of the Oregon coast.
